# YEAR IN REVIEW

# **Aratoi Chair & Director**

This year has been one of great change at Aratoi, but also one that has proved the innovation, resilience, and creativity of our people.

In July 2022 we said haere rā to Director Susanna Shadbolt. Susanna had been with Aratoi since 2016, leading the Museum through difficult times, as it was during the pandemic, and celebratory moments such as our 50th anniversary. She has now taken on the role of Chief Executive of Te Manawa, our sister organization in the Manawatu, and we are more grateful than we can express for the leadership she provided during her time at Aratoi. In September Sarah McClintock joined Aratoi as Director, coming to the Wairarapa from Nelson where she was Curator and Collection Manager at The Suter Art Gallery Te Aratoi o Whakatū.



This year saw Aratoi win big at the Wairarapa Business Awards with the Museum being presented with the Harcourt Hamill Realty Award Innovation Award. Judges were particularly impressed with Aratoi's sustainability ethos, our work with the community, and with our innovative programming. We also received a Qualmark Endorsement with a Bronze Sustainable Tourism Business Award. This award identifies businesses with a high level of professionalism, an awareness of the impact it has on the environment, and a customer-centric approach.

Without a doubt though, the year has been a very busy and most rewarding one for Aratoi particularly in terms of the immense support we have received from our community. We have continued to focus our programme on our local makers and histories, while also developing and bringing in exhibitions and programmes with nationally recognised artists, including Andrea Gardner, Wendy Bornholdt, Julia Teale, Tracy Keith, Victoria McIntosh, and artists from the Print Council of Aotearoa New Zealand. During the year, we actively included over 500 local artists or artists that whakapapa to the Wairarapa region in our programmes and activities.

Public support of Aratoi has grown and visitor numbers for Wairarapa's most popular cultural institution remain high. Education continues to be of great importance at Aratoi. This year we have once again drawn over 5000 participants to Aratoi through our Education programmes and family-focused holiday programmes. Our education programme is offered free of charge thanks to grants received from Masterton Trust Lands Trust, Steadfast Foundation. T G Macarthy and Ministry of Education ELC (Enriching Local Curriculum) funding. We also said farewell to our educator Kate Devenney, who has inspired tamariki and rangatahi from across the Wairarapa with her passion for art. Joining the Aratoi team in June as our Educator was Natasha Priddle, we are excited to see what she brings to Aratoi with her extensive art and education background.



The care of and access to the collection is at the heart of our museum. Our collection is held in perpetuity for the people of the Wairarapa and beyond and our exhibition and education programmes focus strongly on our collection. The collection is managed with Vernon's professional collection management software. The number of donations to the collection was lower this year but did include some significant additions including work by Leah Creaven from her exhibition at Aratoi. Most notably a generous donation of a full wedding outfit dating from the 1930s was accepted and was formally accessioned in July and will be reported in the next financial year.

This year also saw artworks from our collection reach new audiences with our Barbara Hepworth sculpture travelling to Melbourne for a major exhibition of her work at Heide Museum of Modern Art where it joined pieces from around the world. Touring Aotearoa is the major survey exhibition of our Patron Dame Robin White. The exhibition, Robin White: Something is Happening Here, launched at Te Papa before travelling to Auckland Art Gallery, Dunedin Public Art Gallery and Christchurch Art Gallery. Included in this exhibition were the works Summer Grass (2001) and Sam's Place, Bottle Creek (1971) from Aratoi's collection.



Once again, Aratoi performed outstanding work in terms of exhibitions, education, and outreach. During 2022-23, Aratoi staged a total of 23 exhibitions and several smaller displays.

With the easing of Covid restrictions, Aratoi was able to hold more events, public talks and programmes. Our exhibition programme benefitted greatly from ongoing collaboration with artists, collectors, community groups and other cultural institutions as well as from the goodwill of people near and far. Notably among these is the Waipūpū Waka, which involved curating and staging a long-term exhibition around the rare archaeological find and conservation treatment of NZ's second oldest waka (possibly dated AD 640) in partnership with iwi representatives and University of Auckland Conservator Dilys Johns.

We would like to take this opportunity to thank everyone who contributed and continues to contribute, particularly Trust House who, as one of our major sponsors, provides most of the funding for our exhibition programme. A special mention must be made of our two key stakeholders and supporters, Masterton District Council, who provide the majority of our operational funding and Masterton Trust Lands Trust - the building owner.



Our Financial Statements are attached and these show an accounting deficit for the year of \$38,920. Again, we caution that the accounting result is not a reflection of Aratoi's actual cash movement for the year as a significant amount of the adverse variance is a result of a non-cash depreciation charge. When depreciation and capital expenditure are taken into consideration the operating cash result for the year is a small deficit of \$5,696 which is largely in line with what was budgeted.



Our visitation numbers have significantly increased by over 30% from last year, and Aratoi remains one of Wairarapa's best-loved cultural attractions with a satisfaction rate of 90% (as measured by online reviews and the Museums Aotearoa survey). Education and outreach continue to be a critical component of the Museum's work.

We are enormously proud of the way the Museum team worked together during this year of change. We faced and resolved many challenges in fast-moving situations. It is not just the people who make up the staff of the Museum that are important, it is all the people that the Museum touches, the artists, the volunteers, the contractors, the schools, and the visitors that have supported us. Thank you.

We would like to express our sincere appreciation to the Trust Board. The time the Board collectively invests together with their guidance and encouragement is crucial to Aratoi's success. Special thanks must be extended to outgoing Board member Alan Withy, the

Friends of Aratoi, especially Chair Sandra Debney and Deputy Chair Rob Sewell, and the Aratoi Volunteers. We would also like to acknowledge our local iwi and especially thank Rangitāne o Wairarapa Cultural Adviser Mike Kawana and Kaihautū Haami Te Whaiti for their trust, support, and contribution of knowledge which is vital to the operation of Aratoi. Thanks also to the artists who have created the artworks that have inspired and challenged us over the last year. Finally, we would like to acknowledge the hard work and dedication of the Aratoi staff who, despite the challenges, have all helped make this a rewarding year for our organisation.

## **SERVICE ONE - COLLECTIONS**

This financial year, Aratoi curated three major exhibitions showcasing works and objects from the collection: Masterton Museum: A Cabinet of Curiosities, Look Closely and Tell Me What You See: Photographs from the Collection, and Light and Space: Sculpture from the Collection.

The exhibition opened at Te Papa on 4 June 2022, it then opened 28 October at Auckland Art Gallery Toi o Tāmaki before traveling to Dunedin Public Art Gallery where it opened on 11 March 2023. The exhibition opened Christchurch Art Gallery Te Puna o Waiwhetu on 21 July and closes 5 November 2023.

## **SERVICE TWO – EXHIBITIONS**

During 2022 - 23, Aratoi delivered a total of 23 exhibitions as well as a number of smaller displays. The programme included exhibitions of Taonga Māori, social history, art, craft, photography, ceramics, with a number of large-scale in-house developed exhibitions including Masterton Museum: A Cabinet of Curiosities, Burn it all down, and Kotahitanga: Coming Together. This year also saw us ring in the incredibly popular touring exhibition from Nelson Provincial Museum Our Moon: Then, Now and Beyond as well as important solo exhibitions of artists such as Julia Teale, Wendy Bornholdt, and Rebecca Steedman. The exhibitions were supported by a stimulating and diverse programme of openings, floor talks and activities.

Museums enrich our lives and support our well-being, particularly in uncertain times. Aratoi continues to offer an education programme to Wairarapa schools and education providers free of charge. The programme has a strong focus on tīkanga Māori, the Aratoi collection and current exhibitions and is made possible thanks to grants from Masterton Trust Lands Trust, the Steadfast Foundation, TG Macarthy Trust, and a 3-year ELC contract (Enriching Local Curriculum) with the Ministry of Education.



Aratoi with its education programme helps Wairarapa students connect, engage and develop their creativity through positive, fun and interactive experiences. Despite the challenges this year, our education activities alone have once again drawn over 5000 participants to Aratoi. Educational initiatives, such as craft activities for families, and interactive family focused play spaces have helped reach out to our community. We also launched a monthly radio programme with Arrow FM which highlights the work of creatives in the Wairarapa.
